2023 is off to a good start, and in February we had the first two teams for the year – both from the USA.

Pastor Joe Douglass returned to Bulembu for a 12th time and brought a team of 7 incredibly passionate people from all over the USA. They served in their various areas of experience and skill, including ministry to auntie and youth, agriculture, I.T., instrument repair and music, painting school buildings, playground repairs, and assisting at the Clinic. They also enjoyed spending some time with our children in sports and clubs, as well as at Royal Rangers.

Christ's Church of the Valley (CCV) from Phoenix sent a phenomenal team of people who focused on Special Needs and Construction projects. The Special Needs portion of the team conducted valuable workshops with Children's Ministry staff, caregivers and teachers at Potter's Wheel Church, Hawane ICBC and Bulembu respectively, around the awareness of special needs children from a Biblical context.


The construction portion of the team helped converting the conventional concrete floor in one of the Hawane pig pens to a deep litter pen. At Bulembu they installed soft gym flooring and an Occupational Therapy swing in the Special Needs house, both of which was donated from the USA. They also helped prepare a building which has been earmarked for use in the area of Special Needs education at the Primary School.

Both teams were sterling examples of what it means to serve sacrificially and to love like Christ. To say that they were a blessing to the children and communities they served in is an understatement! We're thankful to God for putting together these two teams and for the incredible hearts they had to serve whichever way God needed them to.
